


1. GLEN MORAY



The Scottish distillery Glen Moray can look back on a long history. The founders once took over a former brewery in the town of Elgin and converted it into a whisky distillery. In 1897, they were able to bring their first bottles to the market. With the Elgin Heritage Collection, the distillery presents a range of high-quality whiskies that reflect the experience and knowledge gained over its 120-year existence. This special edition also includes the 15-year-old Glen Moray Single Malt.

This whisky attains its distinctive, smooth and complex taste through its special maturation in two different types of casks. First, it ages in American oak barrels, followed by a finishing period in Oloroso sherry casks.

2. TAMNAVULIN



The "Tamnavulin" distillery was built in 1966 in the Scottish village of Tomnavoulin. After years of production, the distillery was taken over by Whyte & Mackay and shut down in 1995. Shortly afterwards, in 2007, following its acquisition by United Spirits Ltd., extensive renovations took place, allowing production to resume. In the early years, output was still low, but since 2011 the distillery has been operating at full capacity again.

This special Tamnavulin bottling receives a finish in exclusive Spanish Grenache red wine casks after maturing in former bourbon barrels. In addition to the typical sweet and fruity notes of Tamnavulin whiskies, it also develops aromas of fresh red plums and delicate white chocolate.

3. SPEYBURN



John Hopkins was already a successful whisky merchant before he decided to build his own distillery. The Speyside region in Scotland has long been considered home to some of the purest and most mineral-rich waters in the world. This fact led John Hopkins to establish the location of his distillery there. After a long search, he finally found what he was looking for in an unspoilt valley near a tributary of the River Spey and founded the Speyside Distillery.

In 1897, the first cask of whisky was filled to celebrate the 60th anniversary of Queen Victoria's reign. The name "Speyburn Bourbon Cask" already indicates that this whisky spends its entire maturation period in carefully selected former bourbon casks, which give it aromas of vanilla, green apples and honey.

4. BLACK BULL (DUNCAN TAYLOR)



Duncan Taylor has been operating as an independent bottler since the early 20th century. The company gained particular renown through its old and rare whisky bottlings. To this day, the products released under Duncan Taylor are highly valued within the whisky community. Black Bull is one of these brands.

The name of the bottling "Kyloe" comes from the Scottish Highland cattle, as one of the breeds is called that. These animals are especially resilient and thrive on the windy Scottish islands. Perhaps for this reason, the whisky is bottled at a strong 50% ABV. For a balanced smoky and peaty flavour experience, Black Bull Kyloe Peated undergoes additional maturation in ex-peated casks. In addition, fruity and salty aromas can also be found in this whisky.

5. AERSTONE



The Aerstone whiskies are produced by William Grant & Sons. The family-owned company, now in its fifth generation, was founded in 1887 in the Scottish town of Dufftown and has made a significant contribution to whisky history. Among other things, they are responsible for well-known whisky brands such as Glenfiddich and Balvenie.

With Aerstone, William Grant & Sons is bringing two different whiskies to the market that are influenced by their environment. The Aerstone Sea Cask matures for 10 years in warehouses located on the rugged Scottish coast of Ayrshire. Due to its proximity to the sea, a light whisky with maritime notes is created. The soft single malt also displays floral and nutty nuances as well as notes of vanilla, butter biscuits, oak and cotton candy.

6. SINGLETON



The Dufftown Distillery was founded in 1895 by the newly established company Dufftown Glenlivet Distillery Co. in an old, converted grain mill. At that time, there were already five distilleries in Dufftown. From the company of one of the founding members, Peter Mackenzie & Co., the distillery passed through the hands of Arthur Bell & Sons Ltd. to Guinness, making it part of the major Diageo group today.

The Singleton of Dufftown 15 Years is a perfectly balanced and smooth single malt whisky. Maturation takes place in a combination of American and European oak casks. These fine casks give the 15-year-old Singleton multiple layers of flavour. The result is an elegant whisky with sweet honey aromas, notes of fresh fruit, soft spices and creamy vanilla.

7. MALT RIOT



In 1770, The Glasgow Distillery Company was founded. The distillery remained active until its closure at the beginning of the 20th century. In 2014, it was reopened, becoming the first single malt whisky distillery in Glasgow in more than 100 years. To this day, spirits are produced there according to three key principles: quality, authenticity and innovation.

The Malt Riot Blended Whisky is inspired by the riots that broke out in 1725, mainly in Glasgow, due to the planned taxes on barley malt. The blend is made from carefully selected single malts from across Scotland, with their own Glasgow 1770 forming the heart of the whisky. Aromas of oak and sweet vanilla as well as floral notes appear on the nose, while citrus fruits stand out on the palate.

8. KNOCKANDO



The history of the Knockando distillery begins in 1898 with its founder, John Tytler Thomson. The name of the distillery is derived from the Gaelic term "Cnocan-dhu", which means "little black hill." As early as 1899, the distillery had to close again due to financial problems. After a restart in 1903 and another change of ownership, the distillery became part of the Diageo Group in 1987.

Knockando 15 Years matures in a perfect combination of former bourbon and sherry casks. This gives the single malt whisky a fruity, sweet and spicy character. On the nose, aromas of stewed fruits, dark chocolate and sweet spices are enticing. The flavour is shaped by notes of candied apples and woody nuances.

9. GLEN GRANT



Since as early as 1840, Glen Grant has been renowned for its whisky and its history rich in tradition and innovation. After the death of the two founding brothers, John and James Grant, James' son took over the distillery in 1872. Today, Glen Grant belongs to the Campari Group.

At Glen Grant, only pure water from the Caperdonich Well and the Glen Grant Burn, as well as unpeated malted barley, are used to produce their whiskies. Distillation takes place in special stills equipped with a so-called "purifier." This ensures the unique and clean character of Glen Grant whiskies. The fruity and spicy Glen Grant 12 Years is matured in a combination of carefully selected former bourbon and Oloroso sherry casks.

10. TOMINTOUL



The relatively young Tomintoul distillery was founded in 1964 in the heart of the Scottish Speyside region. The distillery, which today belongs to Angus Dundee Distillers, has already been expanded once in its short history with the addition of two further pairs of stills. This took place under the then owner Whyte & Mackay in 1974, after the original founders W & S Strong and Hay & MacLeod had sold the distillery.

In addition to the many single malt bottlings available today, a large part of production is used for the creation of blends. The mild and smooth Tomintoul 10 Years is matured in former bourbon casks. Notes of honey, vanilla and nuts await us on the nose, while flavours of spicy oak stand out on the palate.

11. GLEN SCOTIA



In the small Scottish community of Campbeltown, there were 29 distilleries in the 1830s, one of which was the Scotia Distillery. However, not many of the 29 survived: due to external influences and political dealings, suddenly only three distilleries remained. Scotia was one of them, but it also closed its doors in March 1930. It was the Bloch brothers who revived the distillery in 1933 under the name Glen Scotia - before it was shut down again in 1984.

In 1989, another attempt was made - and this time it was successful. Glen Scotia Campbeltown Harbour is dedicated to the iconic harbour, which once served as the last stop for Scottish whiskies before they began their journey out into the world. Fine notes of sea salt, smoke, vanilla and peach define its flavour profile.

12. CAMERONBRIDGE (SIGNATORY)



The Cameronbridge Distillery was founded in 1824 by John Haig with the goal of producing grain whisky in large quantities. Since the distillery was taken over by Diageo, gin has also been produced there. Most Cameronbridge whiskies are used for the production of blends. It is therefore very rare to have the opportunity to enjoy a single grain whisky from the distillery.

We have this 2012 Cameronbridge whisky thanks to the independent bottler Signatory. The single malt is part of Signatory's 100 Proof Editions. These are quality whiskies with a higher alcohol content that are offered at a lower price, making them accessible even to beginners. Maturation in first-fill bourbon barrels gives the whisky a creamy character.

13. CAISTEAL CHAMUIS (MOSSBURN)



The independent bottler Mossburn places great importance on uniqueness. The range includes two series: the Signature Cask Whiskies and the Vintage Cask Whiskies. The former combine the typical characteristics of regional Scottish malt whiskies from the Islands or Speyside. For this purpose, whiskies from distilleries exclusively from one of these two regions are blended together.

This Caisteal Chamuis is a characterful blend made from a fine selection of single malts from the Scottish Islands. The whisky first matures in refill and first-fill American oak casks before receiving a finish in small first-fill bourbon barrels with a capacity of 200 liters. This gives Caisteal Chamuis medicinal notes, smoky and peaty aromas, and a hint of sweet caramel and nuts.

14. SMOKEHEAD (IAN MACLEOD)



Ian Macleod & Company Ltd. was founded in 1933. In 1963, the company was taken over by the Russell family. Even today, the business remains family-owned and, as a Scottish whisky producer and independent bottler, is an important part of the whisky industry. With the Smokehead whiskies, the name alone already suggests that these are particularly peaty bottlings. The indication that it is an Islay Single Malt also provides information about the smoky contents. However, from which distillery on the Scottish island this whisky originates remains undisclosed.

Powerful peat smoke, sweet honey, sea salt and spices – these aromas define the character of Smokehead Single Malt. They are complemented by notes of fresh citrus fruits and fine ginger.

15. GLENALLACHIE



The name GlenAllachie is derived from the Gaelic "Gleann Aileachadh", which roughly translates to "Valley of the Rocks." The area surrounding the distillery is characterized by Celtic ruins and stones. To create a new, particularly striking logo that is rooted in the origins of the distillery founded in 1967, the letters 2017 were painstakingly carved into stone by a sculptor.

This 10-year-old GlenAllachie whisky was bottled exclusively for the German market. The single malt matures for over 8 years in former bourbon casks, followed by a refinement in high-quality Ruby Port hogsheads. Notes of sweet vanilla and honey as well as aromas of dark fruits shape the flavour profile.

16. HIGHLAND PARK



Behind the Highland Park distillery, founded in 1798 on the Orkney Islands, lies the magic and mysticism of a bygone era that its founder, Magnus Eunson, surely experienced on the island, surrounded by the legacy of the Celts and Vikings. Even today, the whisky is still enveloped in a certain mystery that captivates all fans of the distillery.

The "Highland Park 10 Years," matured predominantly in European and American sherry oak casks, is a lively and smooth single malt that offers aromas of crushed citrus fruits and delicate vanilla cream. In addition, this outstanding whisky reveals a hint of sweet heather honey, fresh oranges, and aromatic peat smoke, as well as a touch of peppery spice.

17. LEDAIG



The Ledaig whiskies are produced by the Scottish distillery "Tobermory." Built in 1798, it is one of the oldest distilleries in Scotland and to this day the only one on the Isle of Mull. The distillery has already had to endure two closures. At the beginning of 2017, it was announced that production would have to be temporarily halted due to renovation work. However, operations resumed in 2019.

The "Ledaig Sinclair Series Rioja Cask" was created in honor of the founder of the Tobermory distillery, John Sinclair. With maturation in former bourbon casks followed by a finish in Rioja red wine casks, this single malt gains, in addition to the typical peaty notes of a Ledaig whisky, aromas of sweet berries, spices, and grapes.

18. LAPHROAIG



Laphroaig - for many, this name is the very embodiment of whisky when it comes to the Isle of Islay. The distillery was founded in 1815 by the brothers Donald and Alex Johnston. The distillery remained in the hands of the founding family until 1954, when the last family member died childless and his secretary, Bessie Williamson, took over the reins at Laphroaig as heir. Despite the distillery being sold in the meantime, she remained its director until 1972.

Laphroaig whisky is especially known for its strongly peated character. "Laphroaig Oak Select" is a particularly light and accessible whisky from the distillery. This single malt is a combination of different cask types: Oloroso sherry butts, first-fill ex-quarter casks, Pedro Ximenez sherry hogsheads, and virgin oak casks.

19. REBEL'S RESERVE (MURRAY McDAVID)



"Murray McDavid" has been active since 1994 and is one of the leading independent bottlers. The home of "Murray McDavid" is the Coleburn Distillery in Speyside, where the tradition of producing high-quality whiskies with special cask maturation is still practiced today.

The name "Rebel's Reserve," chosen for this blended Scotch whisky, is the name of the West Highland White Terrier that adorns the "Murray McDavid" logo. "Rebel's Reserve" combines young single malts from Blair Athol and Benrinnes with significantly older single grain whisky from the Invergordon Distillery. On the nose, one finds aromas of orchard fruits, malt and delicate smoky hints. The palate is characterized by notes of sweet peat smoke, citrus oil and fresh red fruits, followed by spicy oak.

20. ISLE OF SKYE (IAN MACLEOD)



Since its beginnings in 1933, "Isle of Skye" whisky has been a permanent part of the Ian Macleod & Company Ltd. range. The company is now owned by the Russel family and offers a wide assortment of high-quality Scotch whiskies, rum and gin.

The production of "Isle of Skye" uses a combination of peated island whiskies, smooth malts from Speyside and the Highlands, as well as a small proportion of grain whiskies. The 12-year-old "Isle of Skye" whisky is matured in carefully selected oak casks. On the nose, creamy vanilla, orange peel, ground coriander, honey and a subtle smokiness are captivating. The palate is caressed by dried apricots, gooseberries and spices. Smoky notes await us in the finish, combined with chocolate and mint.

21. TULLIBARDINE (MURRAY McDAVID)



The Tullibardine Distillery is located in the village of Blackford, Perthshire. The history of brewing and distilling at Tullibardine dates back to 1488, when King James IV of Scotland stopped at the site—then a brewery—to buy beer. The current distillery was established in 1947, when William Delme Evans converted the site into a whisky distillery. Tullibardine is one of the few distilleries in Scotland where all processes involved in producing their single malts, except for malting, take place on site. This special Tullibardine bottling is part of the "Cask Craft" range from the independent bottler Murray McDavid. The fine single malt was given its finish in high-quality Pedro Ximénez and Oloroso sherry casks. This combination imparts aromas of fruit, chocolate and spices.

22. JURA



Legendary, unspoiled and rugged - that is the island of Jura, located northeast of Islay and south of the Isle of Mull. On this island with around 200 inhabitants, there is only one road, a hotel and a pub besides the distillery, but countless myths and anecdotes.

According to legend, the founder of Jura, Archibald Campbell, was visited by a spirit who encouraged him to supply the island with whisky. He followed this advice and founded the Jura Distillery in 1810.

After maturing in former bourbon casks made from American white oak, the 18-year-old Jura whisky receives a finish in Premier Grand Cru Classé Bordeaux red wine casks from southern France. This gives the single malt wonderful notes of dark fruits, dark chocolate, caramel, coffee and cinnamon.

23. TOMATIN



Founded in 1897, Tomatin can look back on a success story spanning more than 100 years. However, its history is said to trace back as far as the 15th century, when cattle traders sourced their whisky from a distillery located in the Old Laird's House, the site of today's distillery.

The water used to produce the whisky comes from the Alt-na-Frith Burn, which flows through the nearby hills and is known for its purity. After maturing in former bourbon casks, the Tomatin 12 Year Old receives its finish for several months in Spanish sherry casks.

Aromas of heather, pine and cedarwood can be found on the nose of this particularly smooth single malt, while notes of caramel, apples, pears and mango dominate the palate.

24. GLENFIDDICH



In 1886, William Grant fulfilled a long-cherished lifelong dream by building his first distillery. Near his birthplace of Dufftown, in the heart of Speyside, he laid the foundation for what would become the most famous single malt distillery in the world today: Glenfiddich. For many whisky enthusiasts, this classic marked the beginning of their journey into the enjoyment of this fascinating spirit. After all, it was Glenfiddich that opened the doors to the diversity of single malts we know today.

Glenfiddich 18 Year Old matures in the finest Oloroso sherry and bourbon casks. It is then married for at least three months in small, individually numbered casks. The result is an outstanding whisky with aromas of ripe orchard fruits and baked apple on the nose, accompanied by delicate notes of oak and dried fruit on the palate.
